Anjarle is a village in the Dapoli taluka of Ratnagiri district in the Maharashtra state of India. It is located 114 KM towards North from District head quarters Ratnagiri and 17 KM from Dapoli. At the beach, one can see a dense cover of coconut trees to one side with little tops of local Konkani hutment. Every year from February to May, Anjarle beach bears witness to scores of tiny heads of turtle hatchlings.
